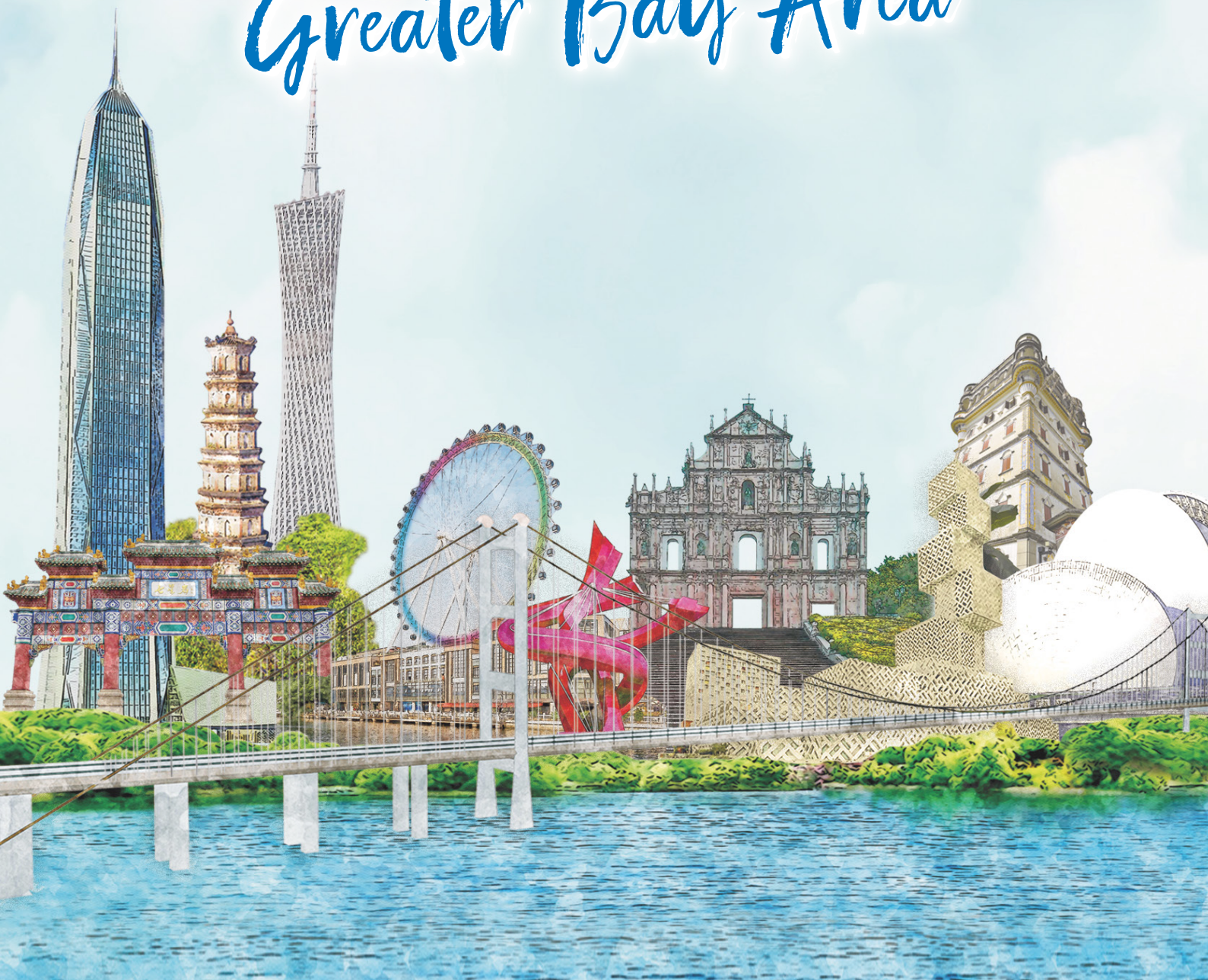


Leveraging Hong Kong's Strengths, Developing a First-class Greater Bay Area

As the new year dawns, we look forward to embracing fresh opportunities and promising developments. Since the promulgation of the Outline Development Plan for the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area in February 2019, the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (Greater Bay Area) has seen increasingly closer and deeper convergence of rules and mechanisms, fuller play to complementary advantages, and greater efficacy in terms of division of work, synergy and economies of scale. From “hard connectivity”, “soft connectivity” to “heartfelt connectivity”, today’s Greater Bay Area is making enormous strides, firmly positioning itself as a strategic fulcrum of the new development pattern of the country, a demonstration zone of high-quality development, and a pioneer of Chinese modernisation.

Amid the complex and volatile geopolitical landscape as well as profound changes in the global trade pattern, the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Development Office (the Office) remains resolute in telling good stories of the Greater Bay Area and Hong Kong, with ever-growing determination. We have continued to, through diversified means and multimedia strategies, promote the significant opportunities of Greater Bay Area development as well as Hong Kong’s important roles as a core city and a core engine for regional development in the Greater Bay Area to Hong Kong, Mainland and overseas stakeholders. We aim to let everyone know that the Greater Bay Area is full of vitality and potential, with a view to attracting overseas talents, enterprises, technologies and capital to Hong Kong, and access the enormous markets of the Greater Bay Area and the Mainland through Hong Kong.

On promoting regional integration, we have actively visited Mainland cities in the Greater Bay Area to holistically strengthen high-level co-operation between Hong Kong and other Greater Bay Area cities, while deepening collaboration and connectivity among industries on this foundation. On 16 and 17 December last year, the Office and the Hong Kong Trade Development Council (HKTDC) co-organised a GoGBA business mission for nearly 30 Hong Kong enterprise representatives to visit innovation and technology (I&T) institutions and enterprises in Shenzhen and Zhuhai. On 27 January this year, we co-hosted a seminar with the Hong Kong Science and Technology Parks Corporation in Shenzhen to explore the opportunities and challenges of cross-boundary applications of low-altitude economy in the Greater Bay Area, contributing to the building of an I&T ecosystem in the Greater Bay Area. Furthermore, the Office

has actively organised and participated in various large-scale exhibitions, including setting up booths at Entrepreneur Day on 4 and 5 December last year and at the Education & Careers Expo from 22 to 25 January this year. During the period from 12 January to March this year, a roving exhibition was staged at various local universities and at the Civic Education Resource Centre of Youth Square, which introduced young people and the public to the opportunities for study, internships, employment and entrepreneurship in the Mainland cities of the Greater Bay Area, enabling young people to tap their talents on a bigger stage.

The Office is dedicated to strengthening domestic ties, so as to promote the opportunities in the Greater Bay Area across the country. We visited key Mainland cities, including Xi’an, Shanghai and Chengdu, to systematically promote the Greater Bay Area advantages in opening up through thematic seminars, business matching and field visits. These efforts have guided Mainland enterprises to capitalise on Hong Kong’s institutional strengths, including its highly internationalised and market-oriented business environment, underpinned by the rule of law, to expand globally.

The Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Development Promotion Centre (Promotion Centre) under the Office has also acted proactively. Through diverse activities such as seminars, business missions and networking luncheons, it has developed exchange platforms to promote the opportunities brought about by the Greater Bay Area to Hong Kong people and enterprises pursuing development in the Mainland cities of the Greater Bay Area, and provide them with practical assistance on various fronts.

Looking ahead to the new year, the HKSAR Government will continue to consolidate and enhance Hong Kong’s institutional strengths under “one country, two systems”, fully promote high-level connectivity within the Greater Bay Area, accelerate the construction of major co-operation platforms, and make all-out efforts to fulfil the positioning and historic mission of the Greater Bay Area as “a strategic fulcrum of the new development pattern of the country, a demonstration zone of high-quality development, and a pioneer of Chinese modernisation”, thereby serving the country’s needs with Hong Kong’s strengths, taking forward the high-quality development of the country and Hong Kong, and contributing to the development of Chinese modernisation.



The Chinese Medicine Hospital of Hong Kong: Building an Innovation Ecosystem, Forging a Bridgehead for Chinese Medicine to Go Global

Chinese medicine embodies millennia of health wisdom from the Chinese nation and stands as China's significant contribution to human civilisation. Under "one country, two systems", Hong Kong is leveraging its dual advantage of having strong support from the motherland and close connection with the world to transform this ancient wisdom into contemporary practice. The simultaneous launch of the Chinese Medicine Hospital of Hong Kong (CMHHK) and the Government Chinese Medicines Testing Institute on 11 December 2025 initiated the formation of an innovation ecosystem for Chinese medicine that integrates academic institutions, hospitals, scientific research and Chinese medicine industry, and conducive to establishing Hong Kong as a bridgehead for Chinese medicine to go global.

Built alongside mountains and seas, the CMHHK embraces the principle of "harmony between humans and nature", and takes "Yin-Yang and Five Elements" as its design philosophy, seamlessly blending traditional architectural aesthetics, Chinese medicine culture, natural environment and modern healthcare technologies. The building is not only a space for medical treatment, but also a cultural vessel for the public to have immersive experience of the "essence, energy and spirit" of Chinese medicine. This spatial practice, rooted in Chinese civilisation, is underpinned by an innovative institutional arrangement. The construction of CMHHK was fully funded by the Government, with Hong Kong Baptist University (HKBU) being commissioned as the contractor to set up, in accordance with the service deed, an operator responsible for daily management, operation and facility maintenance. Under this tripartite framework, the Government-subsidised patient services account for 65% of the total service volume, demonstrating its firm commitment to public healthcare; the HKBU capitalises on its academic and teaching strengths to lay a solid foundation for nurturing Chinese medicine talents; and the professional operator introduces market-oriented mechanisms to enhance service flexibility while ensuring service quality. Each party gives full play to its strengths, charting a new path for Chinese medicine modernisation that combines both warmth and efficiency.

As Hong Kong's first Chinese medicine service-predominant hospital, the CMHHK aims to extend Chinese medicine services to secondary and tertiary healthcare, signifying a major breakthrough in local Chinese medicine development. Meanwhile, the hospital assumes a pivotal role as "change driver", undertaking five key missions, namely healthcare services, education and training, research, collaboration, and creating health values. Through the adoption of three clinical service models, viz. "pure Chinese medicine services", "Chinese medicine-predominant services" and "integrated Chinese-Western medicine services", the hospital delivers personalised and high-quality medical services tailored to individuals' needs and health conditions.

The Chinese Medicine Hospital of Hong Kong: Building an Innovation Ecosystem, Forging a Bridgehead for Chinese Medicine to Go Global

At present, the CMHHK serves as a Chinese medicine teaching hospital for the University of Hong Kong, Chinese University of Hong Kong and HKBU, providing clinical practicum and advanced training for undergraduate students, postgraduate students and practitioners in six major specialties (internal medicine; external medicine; gynaecology; paediatrics; orthopaedics and traumatology; and acupuncture and moxibustion), establishing itself as a vital hub for nurturing Chinese medicine talents. Leveraging its extensive clinical case resources, the hospital has closely collaborated with research teams from the three universities to take forward the development of proprietary Chinese medicines and cutting-edge clinical research, and through the universities' international networks to promote the achievements globally.

The CMHHK actively fosters an open collaboration platform, inviting the participation of distinguished masters, renowned practitioners and scholars in Chinese medicine across the country. This helps create opportunities for exchange and training of Chinese medicine talents from Hong Kong and the Mainland. With the support from the National Administration of Traditional Chinese Medicine and the HKSAR Government, the CMHHK has successively signed strategic collaboration agreements with Guangdong Provincial Hospital of Traditional Chinese Medicine, Beijing Hospital of Traditional Chinese Medicine, authoritative Chinese medicine institutions in Shandong, Tianjin, Chengdu and Jiangsu etc., as well as Kiang Wu Hospital in Macao. These agreements systematically promote joint cultivation of talents, cross-boundary research collaboration, and establishment of clinical standards, building a foundation for deep integration of Chinese medicine in the Greater Bay Area. In tandem, by leveraging Hong Kong's unique advantages, the CMHHK has established strategic partnerships with international institutions such as TCM-Klinik Bad Kötzting in Germany and Western Sydney University in Australia. This has not only expanded the global network of Chinese medicine, but also developed Hong Kong's distinctive "integrated Chinese-Western medicine service model" into a practice paradigm that aligns with international medical systems, paving the way for Chinese medicine to progress from Greater Bay Area collaboration to global recognition.

The CMHHK logo draws inspiration from the building's outline that resembles mountain ranges, with a dignified Chinese character "中" (meaning Chinese) at its centre. It also includes a "moon gate" design common in classical Chinese gardens, honouring traditional architectural aesthetics while welcoming the public into the extensive and profound realm of Chinese medicine. Today, with Hong Kong as a bridgehead, the CMHHK is advancing with humanitarian care as its foundation and scientific collaboration as its bridge, revitalising ancient wisdom within the modern healthcare system, and demonstrating Chinese medicine's unique contemporary values in promoting common well-being of mankind.



Government Chinese Medicines Testing Institute: Inheriting Herbal Wisdom, Promoting Scientific Innovation



The Government Chinese Medicines Testing Institute (GCMTI), under the Department of Health, is located at Pak Shing Kok Road in Tseung Kwan O, adjacent to the CMHHK. These two flagship institutions commenced operation simultaneously on 11 December 2025, embodying in modern times the millennia-old complementarity between Chinese medicine practice and Chinese medicines.

The HKSAR Government is committed to promoting Hong Kong's integration into the construction of Chinese medicine highlands in the Greater Bay Area and the overall development of Chinese medicine in the country. With the official release of the first Chinese Medicine Development Blueprint, the GCMTI plays a pivotal role in fostering the comprehensive and high-quality development of Chinese medicine in Hong Kong.

Since its establishment in 2017, the GCMTI has been dedicated to developing internationally recognised standards and testing methods for Chinese medicines. Through technology transfer, it helps the industry in enhancing quality control capabilities, so as to establish the brand image of Hong Kong's Chinese medicines, and promote the global expansion of Chinese medicine. Besides, the Hong Kong Chinese Materia Medica Standards (HKCMMS) Project, launched in 2002, has thus far published reference standards for over 340 Chinese materia medica, laying a solid foundation for quality assurance of local Chinese medicines. Currently, the GCMTI operates four professional laboratories equipped with over 3 300 pieces of state-of-the-art equipment, continuously advancing testing technologies towards greater speed, precision and universality, while fully enhancing standard development capabilities and the ability to develop testing methods for Chinese medicines.





Government Chinese Medicines Testing Institute: Inheriting Herbal Wisdom, Promoting Scientific Innovation



Since 2022, the GCMTI has participated in the Fourth National Survey of Chinese Materia Medica Resources (Hong Kong Region) led by the National Administration of Traditional Chinese Medicine. It compiled the “Preliminary List of Chinese Materia Medica Resources in Hong Kong”, documenting over 1 250 species of medicinal plants, which has been officially incorporated into the “Checklist of Chinese Materia Medica Resources in China”. On this foundation, experts and representatives from the local Chinese medicine sector selected 50 medicinal plants with distinctive Hong Kong characteristics from the list for inclusion in the publication “Hong Kong Characteristic Medicinal Plants”. The publication has been listed in the “Encyclopedia of Chinese Materia Medica Resources” series by the National Administration of Traditional Chinese Medicine. On 30 July 2025, the Department of Health signed a co-operation arrangement with the Guangzhou Municipal Regulatory Administration, which supports enhanced collaboration between the GCMTI and the Guangzhou Institute for Drug Control in Chinese medicine testing technologies, thereby jointly taking forward the high-quality development of Chinese medicine in the Greater Bay Area. In line with the implementation of the Chinese Medicine Development Blueprint, the GCMTI will deepen co-operation with testing institutions in the Mainland and the Greater Bay Area, promote advanced testing technologies, and explore developing the HKCMMS into internationally recognised reference standards for quality assessment of Chinese materia medica, with a view to facilitating the cross-regional flow and international trade development of Chinese materia medica.



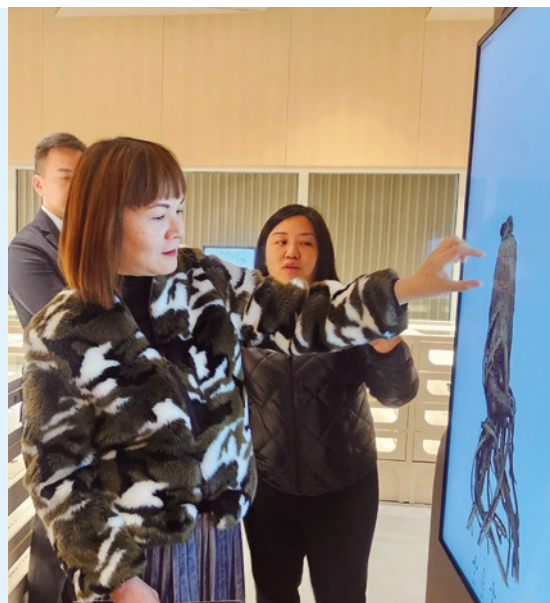
The GCMTI’s interior features different function zones inspired by the Five Elements—Wood, Fire, Water, Earth and Metal, subtly integrating the ancient philosophy of Chinese medicine with modern architecture. In the Chinese Medicines Herbarium, 3 500 specimens are exhibited in transparent glass cabinets. Over 300 specimens of them were gifted by the National Medical Products Administration, covering representative and precious materia medica from different regions across the country, including rare giant wild Astragali Radix and Cistanches Herba. To embrace the concept of “tracing the source and establishing standards for authenticity”, all specimens have been authenticated by authoritative experts, and clear and traceable source chains established by collecting source plants and medicinal materials from the same geographical area. Through the systematic display in the herbarium and the transparent design of the laboratories, visitors can observe the complete “life journey” of Chinese medicines, from source plants and medicinal materials to decoction pieces and proprietary Chinese medicines, greatly enhancing public understanding of Chinese medicine science.



Government Chinese Medicines Testing Institute: Inheriting Herbal Wisdom, Promoting Scientific Innovation

On 26 March 2024, the GCMTI launched the Digital Herbarium for Chinese Medicines (www.cmherbarium.gov.hk), marking a significant milestone in the digitalisation of Chinese medicines. As the world's first online platform applying "photogrammetry" to reconstruct three-dimensional morphology and spatial characteristics of materia medica, the digital herbarium precisely presents delicate textures and three-dimensional structures of materia medica, while providing scientific support for establishing traceability between Chinese materia medica and their species origins. The Digital Herbarium for Chinese Medicines has now become a widely-accessible and free digital resource, making cloud-based identification of Chinese medicines possible.

The GCMTI's Shennong Herbal Garden, covering 700 square metres, is Hong Kong's first botanic garden featuring medicinal plants with Lingnan characteristics. It is also a window for the public to gain insights into Chinese medicine culture. The garden houses approximately 180 species of medicinal plants, with its overall layout centring on "local herbal teas" and "seasonal soups". The herbal tea section is organised by medicinal functions, showcasing materia medica that dispel wind-dampness, clear heat and release the exterior. The soup section is arranged according to seasons and solar terms, featuring medicinal plants that relieve cough and panting, regulate energy, promote blood circulation and resolve stasis. Here, the concept of "food as medicines" transcends theory to become an accessible and comprehensible approach to daily wellness.



Leveraging Hong Kong's unique advantages of having strong support from the motherland and close connection with the world, the GCMTI has continued to empower the inheritance and development of Chinese medicines with modern technologies. This rational yet warm wisdom, rooted in Chinese civilisation, practised through Hong Kong, serving Greater Bay Area collaboration, and addressing global needs, is making unique contributions to human health endeavours.



Telling Good Stories of the Greater Bay Area

The Office has been telling good stories of the Greater Bay Area through diversified and multimedia means, so as to promote the significant opportunities of Greater Bay Area development. We have also continued to, through the Promotion Centre in Guangzhou, further enhance the publicity and promotion efforts in the Mainland cities of the Greater Bay Area, as well as providing support for Hong Kong people, enterprises and youngsters to help them grasp the development opportunities in the Greater Bay Area.



24 October



The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, delivered a video speech at the graduation ceremony of an entrepreneurship acceleration programme for rising stars, remarking that the Greater Bay Area's vibrant economy and innovative resources make it the ideal entry point for Hong Kong young people to integrate into the overall national development and pursue their careers. The graduation ceremony signified a deep connection between Hong Kong young people and the Greater Bay Area's entrepreneurial ecosystem, injecting new momentum into regional innovation and entrepreneurship. She encouraged participants to seize opportunities in the Greater Bay Area and actively engage in and contribute to Greater Bay Area development with innovative thinking. The Assistant Commissioner, Miss Cathy Li, attended the graduation ceremony in Guangzhou.

This programme was co-organised by the Promotion Centre and the Guangzhou Municipal Haizhu District Human Resources and Social Security Bureau, with support from various institutions in Guangdong and Hong Kong. The five-day training attracted the participation of 30 young people from Hong Kong, who through professional courses, enterprise visits and resource matching etc., were helped to overcome geographical limitations and realise their entrepreneurial dreams in the Greater Bay Area. The event brought together over 130 guests to witness the participants' learning outcomes.

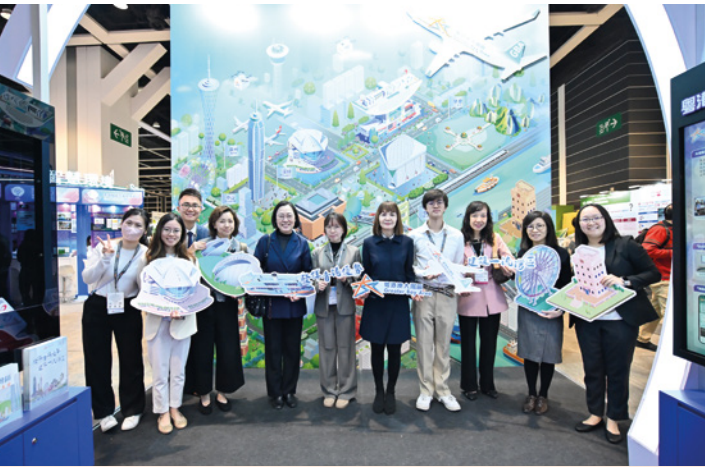

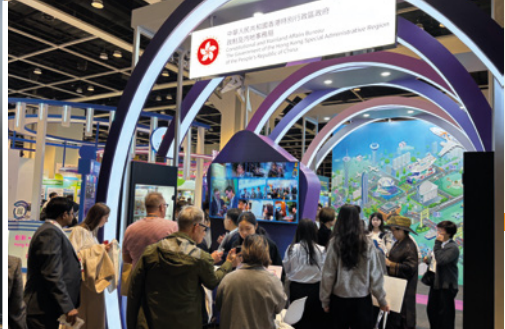
The Deputy Commissioner, Ms Aubrey Fung, attended and delivered a speech at the 2025 Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Entrepreneurs Promotion Conference in Shenzhen. At the conference, she met and exchanged views with political and business leaders from Guangdong, Hong Kong, Macao and Malaysia, promoting Hong Kong's role as a dual platform for attracting foreign investment and for enterprises to go global. In her speech, the Deputy Commissioner welcomed overseas enterprises and talents to Hong Kong and expressed hope that more Mainland enterprises will "set sail" for global markets through Hong Kong to seize unlimited development opportunities.

The promotion conference was organised by the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Bay Area Entrepreneurs Alliance, with the Promotion Centre as one of the supporting organisations. The event aimed to strengthen exchange and co-operation between Greater Bay Area enterprises and ASEAN markets, and promote in-depth mutual connection in different realms, thereby contributing to the high-quality development of the Greater Bay Area.



4 to 5 December

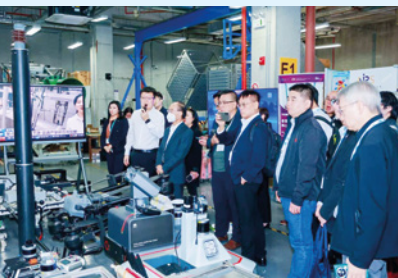
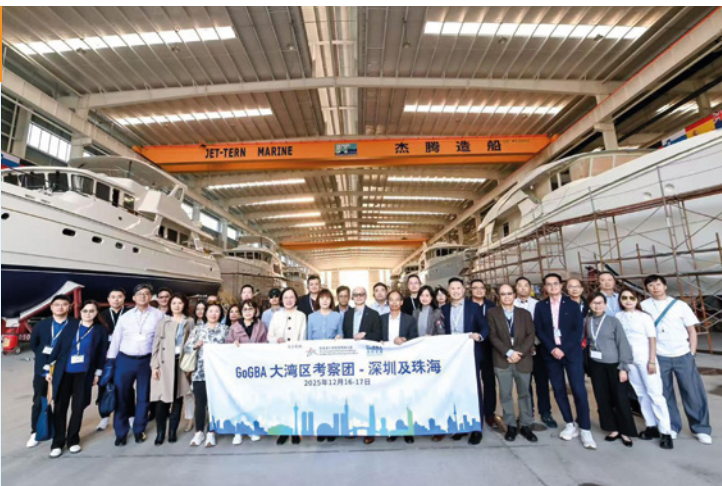
The Office set up a dedicated booth at the Entrepreneur Day exhibition held by the HKTDC at the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre, introducing the entrepreneurial opportunities brought by Greater Bay Area development and various support services available to aspiring entrepreneurs, particularly young people, wishing to pursue development in the Mainland cities of the Greater Bay Area.



16 to 17 December

The Office and the HKTDC co-organised a GoGBA business mission for nearly 30 Hong Kong enterprise representatives to Shenzhen and Zhuhai. The business mission included visits to I&T institutions and enterprises, and exchanges with local government officials as well as representatives of chambers of commerce and enterprises. Participants gained insights into the latest development of new quality productive forces across various sectors in both cities and explored co-operation opportunities.

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, who joined the delegation, remarked that the GoGBA business mission aimed to help Hong Kong I&T and manufacturing enterprises gain first-hand understanding of the development of high-tech industries in the Greater Bay Area, so as to enhance productivity and competitiveness of Hong Kong enterprises, while enabling enterprises in both places to forge ties and explore collaboration.





18 December

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, delivered a video speech at a conference in Guangzhou that explored how venture capital can empower transformation of research and development (R&D) outcomes in the Greater Bay Area, highlighting that given its robust judicial and intellectual property (IP) protection systems, full-chain financing market and internationalised business environment, Hong Kong is the best gateway for Mainland enterprises to go global. The Commissioner also remarked that the HKSAR Government has been actively implementing the Hong Kong Innovation and Technology Development Blueprint, providing a vital platform for gathering global I&T resources and talents. Hong Kong will continue to deepen its close co-operation with other Greater Bay Area cities to build a more comprehensive and globally competitive I&T ecosystem.

The event was jointly organised by the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the People's Government of Guangdong Province, the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau, and the Guangdong Technology Financial Group Co. Ltd., attracting around 300 representatives of government departments, financial institutions, higher education institutions, research institutes and enterprises from both places. The Assistant Commissioner, Miss Cathy Li, attended the event in Guangzhou.

12 January to 20 March 2026

The Office staged a Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area roving exhibition at the eight universities and at the Civic Education Resource Centre of Youth Square. The exhibition mainly introduced the policy measures in different areas of the Greater Bay Area, and support programmes for Hong Kong young people, etc.

On 16 January, the Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, visited the exhibition area at the Education University of Hong Kong. She remarked that the Office has been implementing publicity and promotional initiatives through various channels to make the development opportunities in the Greater Bay Area to be "seen and felt", with the aim of helping different sectors of society, particularly the youth of Hong Kong, to realise their full potential. During the visit, the Commissioner had friendly exchanges with the students there, encouraging them to grasp the development opportunities in the Greater Bay Area.





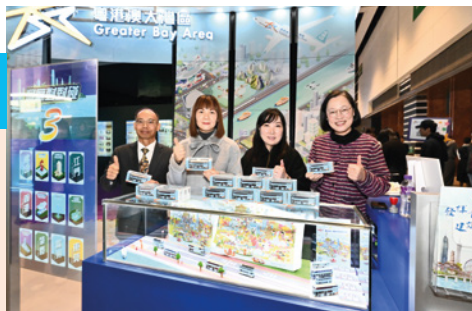
13 January

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, attended and delivered a speech at the GBA CEO Club 2nd Council Inauguration and 2nd Anniversary Dinner, remarking that the Greater Bay Area's vibrant economy has made it a hub for high-end talents and innovative resources, and the HKSAR Government greatly welcomes and supports more Mainland enterprises (including those in the Greater Bay Area) to explore global markets by leveraging Hong Kong's unique advantages of having close connectivity with both the Mainland and the world.

During the event, the Promotion Centre set up an exhibition booth at the venue, which featured its support services for Hong Kong people and enterprises pursuing development in the Greater Bay Area.

22 to 25 January

The Office set up a booth at the Education & Careers Expo 2026 at the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre to introduce the choices and opportunities for study, internships, employment and entrepreneurship in the Mainland cities of the Greater Bay Area, and support Hong Kong young people in grasping the significant opportunities brought about by Greater Bay Area development to realise their aspirations.



27 January

The Office held a seminar in Shenzhen on the “cross-boundary applications of the low-altitude economy in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area: opportunities and challenges” to explore development directions of the low-altitude economy, with a number of industry leaders and think-tank representatives being invited to share their insights. The seminar attracted over 200 participants from Hong Kong and various Mainland cities. The Assistant Commissioner, Miss Cathy Li, attended the event in Shenzhen.

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, delivered a pre-recorded speech, stating that the Greater Bay Area not only provides fertile ground for the development of the low-altitude economy but is also well-positioned to be a global pioneer and pilot demonstration area in the low-altitude economy. The HKSAR Government is contributing proactively to the low-altitude economy. Following the launch of the Regulatory Sandbox X scheme, the HKSAR Government will issue the Action Plan on Developing Low-Altitude Economy this year to promote Hong Kong as a hub for low-altitude innovation and applications.



30 January

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, attended the 2026 GBA Youth Entrepreneurship Festival organised by the Promotion Centre in Guangzhou, which provided a platform for young entrepreneurs in the Greater Bay Area to showcase their ventures as well as exchange and share ideas. In her speech, the Commissioner remarked that the HKSAR Government has been actively aligning with the National 15th Five-Year Plan, and fully supporting young people in seizing opportunities in the Greater Bay Area to engage in innovative practices and realise their aspirations. The Promotion Centre in Guangzhou, under the Office, has continued to collaborate with youth entrepreneurship bases and other institutions to provide practical support for young people. The event was co-organised by the Promotion Centre and the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (Guangdong) Innovation and Entrepreneurship Incubation Base, featuring an entrepreneurship bazaar, investment and financing matching sessions, and a technology experience zone. Investment and financing experts and Hong Kong young entrepreneurs were invited to share their hands-on experience. Over 40 youth start-ups participated in the event, with more than 350 people in attendance.



30 to 31 January

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, joined the “Dreams to GBA Come True”—An Exploration into the Aerospace, Aviation and Technology in Zhuhai, co-organised by the Office and the Education Bureau in Zhuhai. Along with around 160 Hong Kong secondary school teachers and students of the study tour, she visited the Zhuhai Aerospace Land and the education centre on Zhuhai national defence mobilisation (civil air defence), learning about the country’s latest developments in aviation and aerospace technologies, national defence education, civil air defence construction, disaster response and public safety, and taking the opportunity to tell good stories of Hong Kong. The Commissioner encouraged students interested in the aerospace industry to seize opportunities and contribute to the country.



Visits to Greater Bay Area Cities

The Office has also actively conducted visits to various cities of the Greater Bay Area, with a view to enhancing Hong Kong's high-level co-operation with Guangdong and other Greater Bay Area cities, thereby strengthening connectivity and integrated development within the Greater Bay Area.



27 October



The Head of the Promotion Centre, Ms Fiona Lee, visited Zhongying Street in Shatoujiao, Yantian District, Shenzhen. She engaged in in-depth exchanges with representatives from the Zhongying Street Administration Bureau, and conducted site visits to understand the street's unique historical and cultural value as well as new development pathways. She also introduced the functions of the Promotion Centre and expressed hope for strengthened mutual co-operation in the future.



30 October

The Head of the Promotion Centre, Ms Fiona Lee, attended and delivered a speech at the inauguration ceremony of the 9th executive and supervisory committees of a Hong Kong manufacturers' association for friendship in Shiwan Town, Boluo County, Huizhou City. She encouraged local enterprises to leverage Hong Kong's unique advantages and position under "one country, two systems" and expand into overseas markets through Hong Kong.

7 January 2026

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, visited the Shenzhen Bay Culture Square and two I&T enterprises specialising in the R&D of augmented reality and artificial intelligence (AI) glasses in Shenzhen to learn about the latest practice of cultural and technological integration in the Greater Bay Area.

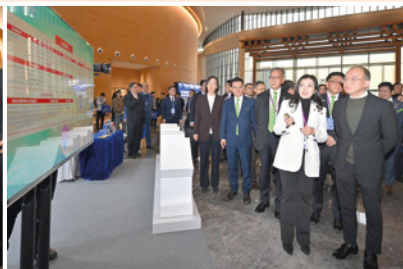
One of the enterprises develops AI glasses equipped with full-colour MicroLED transparent display technology, featuring functions of real-time object recognition and multi-language instant translation, etc. The other enterprise applies "AI + 3D" technology to create immersive mixed-reality experiences for various museums and art galleries in the Mainland. The Commissioner encouraged both enterprises to leverage Hong Kong's world-class financial system and professional service networks to expand their businesses, and use Hong Kong as a springboard to explore global markets, thereby contributing to the country's high-quality development.



9 January

The then Secretary for Constitutional and Mainland Affairs (SCMA), Mr Erick Tsang Kwok-wai, attended the GBA iForum cum Dinner 2026 in Nansha, Guangzhou. With the theme of “leveraging Hong Kong’s international advantages to foster the Greater Bay Area’s internal and external connectivity”, the event focused on promoting new industrialisation development in the Greater Bay Area and opportunities for enterprises to go global, while deepening industrial synergy between Guangdong and Hong Kong.

During the event, the SCMA visited the exhibition area to gain insights into Nansha’s development planning and exchanged views with several Hong Kong young entrepreneurs in the Greater Bay Area.



13 January

The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, visited Hong Kong-invested timepiece and food enterprises in Dongguan to study their effectiveness in transformation and upgrading through smart technologies and branding. She visited an integrated timepiece industry park developed by Hong Kong entrepreneurs in Dongguan, and a well-established Hong Kong-invested food enterprise, which has introduced smart automated production lines and expanded the range of product lines such as health food products. 15 January

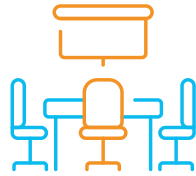

The HKSAR Government collaborates closely with Guangdong Province and other Greater Bay Area cities under the principle of complementarity with a view to enhancing the efficient and smooth flow of essential factors of production such as people, goods, capital and information. At the same time, the HKSAR Government has been continuously deepening collaboration between Hong Kong and other Greater Bay Area cities, thereby strengthening connectivity and integrated development within the Greater Bay Area. Since October 2025, various major policy measures have been rolled out and a number of high-level meetings smoothly held, constantly fostering regional co-operation to new depths.

20 October

The Hong Kong/Guangdong Expert Group on Co-operation in Informatisation convened its 20th meeting in Hong Kong to review the work progress over the past year and exchange views on the work plan for the coming year.

22 to 25 October

The third edition of "Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area High-quality Talent Development Conference" jointly organised by the governments of Guangdong, Hong Kong and Macao was held in Macao. The Deputy Chief Secretary for Administration, Mr Cheuk Wing-hing, attended and delivered a speech at the conference. The Hong Kong Talent Engage also set up a booth at the venue to promote Hong Kong's talent admission schemes and career opportunities in different sectors, to encourage talent settling in Hong Kong.

25 October

The Fifth Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Legal Professional Examination was smoothly held. Currently, over 620 Hong Kong and Macao legal practitioners have passed the GBA examination and obtained the Lawyer's License (Guangdong-Hongkong-Macao Greater Bay Area) to provide legal services in the nine Mainland municipalities in the Greater Bay Area on specified civil and commercial matters to which the Mainland laws apply.

The 4th Rule of Law Forum on Construction of Global Marine Center Cities and the Marine Rule of Law Forum for Greater Bay Area organised by the Shenzhen Court of International Arbitration was held in Shenzhen. The Deputy Secretary for Justice, Dr Cheung Kwok-kwan, delivered a speech at the forum.

31 October



The Chief Executive delivered a video speech at the opening ceremony of the 4th Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Fair for Trade in Services held in Zhuhai. He emphasised that Hong Kong will leverage its unique advantages of having close connectivity with both the Mainland and the world to fully promote the high-quality development of trade in services in the Greater Bay Area.

31 October

6

The China National Intellectual Property Administration hosted a press conference in Guangzhou on “IP’s contributions towards high-quality development of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area”. The Deputy Director of Intellectual Property Department of the HKSAR Government, Mr Thomas Tsang Chi-sham, introduced the facilitation measures and progress in taking forward cross-boundary IP protection by IP authorities in Hong Kong and the Mainland.



7

31 October, and 18 and 23 December



The HKSAR Government announced on 31 October the implementation details of Southbound Travel for Guangdong Vehicles. Starting from 0:00 am on 23 December 2025, eligible and approved Guangdong vehicles may enter the urban area of Hong Kong via the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge. The number of vehicles entering Hong Kong is capped at 100 per day for a stay of up to three days per vehicle. Southbound Travel for Guangdong Vehicles is, in the first phase, open to application from four cities in Guangdong Province (namely Guangzhou, Zhuhai, Zhongshan and Jiangmen), to be gradually extended to other cities in Guangdong Province after six months. 3 November

8

The National Immigration Administration announced a series of new measures to support high-level opening up and high-quality development. These measures include the implementation of “facial recognition” intelligent exit-entry clearance at various ports in the Mainland, including the Huanggang, Luohu, Liantang, Futian and Wenjindu Ports in Shenzhen, as well as the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge Port; facilitating the efficient cross-boundary flow of production factors within the Shenzhen Park of the Hetao Shenzhen-Hong Kong Science and Technology Innovation Co-operation Zone; and the addition of five ports in Guangdong Province as entry ports under the 240-hour visa-free transit policy, namely West Kowloon Station of Guangzhou-Shenzhen-Hong Kong Express Rail Link, Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge, Hengqin, Guangzhou Pazhou Ferry Terminal and Zhongshan Port.



3 November

9

The 2025 Global Investment Promotion Conference for the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area, jointly organised by the governments of Guangdong, Hong Kong and Macao, was held in Guangzhou. In his video speech, the Chief Executive emphasised that under “one country, two systems” principle, Hong Kong serves as a “super connector” and “super value-adder”, fully aligning with the Greater Bay Area’s development needs while jointly exploring global opportunities.



10

3 to 5 November



The Training Course for Legal Departments in Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area organised by the Department of Justice was held in Hong Kong. Run by the Hong Kong International Legal Talents Training Academy, the three-day training course attracted nearly 40 personnel from the Department of Justice of Guangdong Province, Justice Bureaux of the Greater Bay Area and other Mainland municipalities, the Macao SAR Government and the Department of Justice of Hong Kong. The training course deepened participants’ understanding of Hong Kong’s legal system and strengthened legal exchanges and practical co-operation in the Greater Bay Area.

7 November

11

The Shenzhen-Hong Kong Financial Co-operation Committee convened its third meeting in Hong Kong under the co-chairmanship of the Secretary for Financial Services and the Treasury, Mr Christopher Hui, and the Vice Mayor of the Shenzhen Municipal People’s Government and Director General of the Office of the Financial Affairs Committee of the Communist Party of China (CPC) Shenzhen Municipal Committee, Mr Luo Huanghao. At the meeting, the Financial Services and the Treasury Bureau and the Shenzhen Municipal Financial Regulatory Bureau signed a Memorandum of Understanding in relation to co-operation in gold-related aspects.



12

7 November



The Government announced that the Pilot Scheme for Direct Cross-boundary Ambulance Transfer in the Greater Bay Area will be extended to Zhuhai People’s Hospital and the Nansha Division of the First Affiliated Hospital, Sun Yat-sen University from 9 November. The pilot scheme will be extended for one year until 29 November 2026.

12 November

13

The Deputy Financial Secretary, Mr Michael Wong, and the Vice Mayor of the Shenzhen Municipal People’s Government, Mr Tao Yongxin, leading delegations of the governments of the HKSAR and Shenzhen respectively, held the seventh meeting of the Task Force for Collaboration on the Northern Metropolis Development Strategy in Shenzhen. At the meeting, the HKSAR Government presented the progress on taking forward the three pilot areas for large-scale land disposal at Hung Shui Kiu, Fanling North and San Tin Technopole, and the ecotourism nodes at Tsim Bei Tsui and Pak Nai. Both sides also exchanged views on the development of the Hetao Shenzhen-Hong Kong Science and Technology Innovation Co-operation Zone, the progress for the planning and development of the Hong Kong-Shenzhen Western Rail Link (Hung Shui Kiu-Qianhai) and the Northern Link Spur Line, as well as the redevelopment of the Sha Tau Kok Boundary Control Point.



14

18 November



The 2025 Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Medical Products Administration Conference was convened in Hong Kong. At the conference, representatives from the National Medical Products Administration and the regulatory authorities of Guangdong, Hong Kong and Macao exchanged views on enhancing the working mechanism for regulatory collaborations on drugs and medical devices in the Greater Bay Area, and fostering the innovation development on regulating drugs and medical devices in the region.

18 November

15

The 2025 Guangdong/Hong Kong Seminar on IP and Development of SMEs, entitled "Challenges of IP Rights in the Age of Artificial Intelligence", was held in Jiangmen to explore the impacts and challenges that AI technology development poses to IP protection within the innovation ecosystem. The seminar aimed to enhance the awareness, protection and efficient use of IP among Hong Kong SMEs in Guangdong Province and Mainland enterprises.



16

19 November



The Financial Services and the Treasury Bureau and the Shenzhen Municipal Financial Regulatory Bureau jointly promulgated the Action Plan for Jointly Building Hong Kong-Shenzhen Global Fintech Hub (2025-2027), which puts forward various key initiatives to further consolidate and enhance Hong Kong's status as an international financial centre, as well as supporting Shenzhen to develop into an industrial finance centre with significant global influence.

20 November

17

The HKSAR Government promulgated the Conceptual Outline of the Development Plan for the Innovation and Technology Industry in the San Tin Technopole, which provides a top-level design for the 210 hectares of new I&T land in the San Tin Technopole in terms of development vision, objectives and positioning, industrial spatial layout, and development model, thereby setting a clear development strategy for the San Tin Technopole.



18

21 November



The Chief Executive, Mr John Lee, on behalf of the HKSAR Government, signed the agreement on strengthening of sports co-operation and promotion of integrated development (the Four-Party Agreement) with the General Administration of Sport of China, the Guangdong Provincial Government and the Macao SAR Government in Shenzhen. The Four-Party Agreement aims to strengthen sports exchanges and integrated development in the Greater Bay Area.



19

21 November

The Social Welfare Department signed Memoranda of Understanding with the Bank of China (Hong Kong) and the Industrial and Commercial Bank of China (Asia) respectively to establish a collaborative arrangement for the cross-border disbursement of portable cash assistance. The new service is expected to be officially launched in mid-2026.

24 November

371 Hong Kong construction and engineering professionals have passed the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area engineering "Professional Title" evaluation and obtained corresponding professional qualifications on the Mainland. At present, the evaluation mechanism has expanded to cover 10 disciplines, and a total of 578 Hong Kong professionals have obtained Mainland "Professional Title" qualifications.

26 November



The Secretary for Security, Mr Tang Ping-keung, and the Vice Mayor of the Shenzhen Municipal People's Government, Mr Luo Huanghao, co-chaired a meeting of the task force on the collaboration for the planning and development of Hong Kong-Shenzhen control points in Hong Kong. At the meeting, the two delegations discussed the planning and development of land boundary control points (BCPs), and exchanged views on the latest progress of redevelopment projects of Huanggang and Sha Tau Kok BCPs.

The Chief Secretary for Administration, Mr Chan Kwok-ki, attended and delivered a speech at the sixth Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area development forum and prize presentation ceremony.

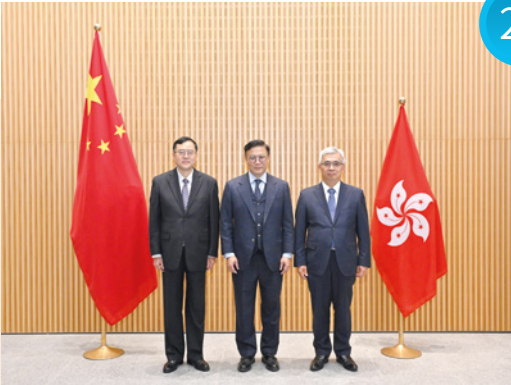
The 7th Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Conference on the Inheritance, Innovation, and Development of Traditional Chinese Medicine was held in Hong Kong for the first time. The conference was jointly organised by the Health Bureau of the HKSAR Government, the Traditional Chinese Medicine Bureau of Guangdong Province, and the Health Bureau of the Macao SAR Government, with the Department of Health, the Hospital Authority and the Chinese Medicine Hospital of Hong Kong as co-organisers. At the conference, the Chinese Medicine Hospital of Hong Kong signed strategic collaboration agreements with various Mainland provincial-level hospitals and international institutions, and multiple Chinese medicine co-operation projects within the Greater Bay Area were also signed.

9 December



The Deputy Secretary for Justice, Dr Cheung Kwok-kwan, hosted the seventh Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Legal Departments Joint Conference. At the conference, representatives of the three governments engaged in comprehensive discussions on several major areas, such as the interfaces of legal talent and regulatory frameworks of mediation and arbitration. A consensus was also reached on the proposal by the Department of Justice to establish a Greater Bay Area commercial mediation and arbitration platform.

10 December

The Deputy Secretary for Justice, Dr Cheung Kwok-kwan, led a delegation of representatives from various professional fields, including law and accounting, to Shenzhen for exchanges with representatives from Mainland enterprises and industry associations. The event was co-organised for the first time by the Department of Justice and the Qianhai Authority of Shenzhen.

11 December



The Secretary for Health, Professor Lo Chung-mau, and the Director General of the Public Hygiene and Health Commission of Shenzhen Municipality, Ms Wu Hongyan, hosted the second meeting of the Task Force for Medical Collaboration between Shenzhen and Hong Kong in Hong Kong. At the meeting, representatives from both places had in-depth discussions on the continued advancement of cross-boundary medical collaboration between the two cities.

12 to 13 December

The 2025 Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao academician summit and Greater Bay Area conference on technological achievements of State Key Laboratories was held in Shenzhen, with the Chief Executive delivering a video speech.

Residential Care Services Scheme in Guangdong launches pilot medical subsidy arrangement

30

17 December



The Social Welfare Department commissioned China Taiping Life Insurance (Hong Kong) Company Limited to assist the HKSAR Government in implementing the Residential Care Services Scheme in Guangdong—Pilot Medical Subsidy Arrangement for two years starting from 22 December 2025. Elderly participants can apply for the subsidy concerning their self-paid medical expenses incurred at any designated medical institutions within the Greater Bay Area under the coverage of the National Basic Medical Insurance Policy.

17 December

31

The Secretary for Environment and Ecology, Mr Tse Chin-wan, and the Director-General of the Department of Ecology and Environment of Guangdong Province, Ms Xu Xiaoxia, co-chaired the seventh meeting of the Hong Kong-Guangdong Joint Working Group on Environmental Protection and Combating Climate Change via video conferencing. The meeting reviewed their work progress in 2025 and agreed on the collaboration work plan for 2026.

18 December



The then SCMA, Mr Erick Tsang Kwok-wai, and member of the Standing Committee of the CPC Shenzhen Municipal Committee and Director General of the Authority of Qianhai Shenzhen-Hong Kong Modern Service Industry Co-operation Zone of Shenzhen Municipality, Mr Wang Shourui, leading representatives of relevant bureaux and departments of the HKSAR Government and the delegation of the Shenzhen Municipal Government respectively, held the second meeting of the Task Force on the Development of the Qianhai Shenzhen-Hong Kong Modern Service Industry Co-operation Zone in Shenzhen. Both sides exchanged views on issues such as deepening the integrated development of technology and finance, joint talent attraction, and the alignment of rules in the field of engineering construction, while jointly witnessing the inauguration ceremony of two projects, namely "SZ-HK Nexus" Qianhai Shenzhen-Hong Kong Dual Headquarters Hub and HK SME Empower Centre. The Commissioner, Ms Maisie Chan, also attended the meeting.

The HKSAR Government released the first Chinese Medicine Development Blueprint of Hong Kong. The Blueprint aligns with the country's overall strategies on Chinese medicine development, strives to promote Hong Kong's better integration into the construction of Chinese medicine highlands in the Greater Bay Area and the overall national development of Chinese medicine, and establishes Hong Kong as a bridgehead for the global expansion of Chinese medicine.

The Chief Executive, Mr John Lee, officiated at the opening ceremony of the Hong Kong Park of the Hetao Shenzhen-Hong Kong Science and Technology Innovation Co-operation Zone (Hetao Co-operation Zone). The Hong Kong Park is developed in batches under two phases and divided into different zones focusing on pillar industries such as life and health technology, AI and data science, new technologies and advanced manufacturing, thereby fostering the integrated development of upstream, midstream and downstream industries and building a comprehensive I&T industry chain. The Western Cross-River Link Bridge Project also commenced on the same day, which will connect the two parks in Hong Kong and Shenzhen, further opening up the transportation network of the Hetao Co-operation Zone, facilitating the cross-boundary flow of personnel, and showcasing the advantages of the Shenzhen-Hong Kong boundary facilities and innovative management policies.

The Health Bureau announced that the Greater Bay Area International Clinical Trial Institute, established and wholly owned by the HKSAR Government, officially established the Real-World Study and Application Centre, and simultaneously launched the Greater Bay Area Clinical Trial Collaboration Platform.

29 December

The Digital Policy Office set up a Hong Kong Cross-boundary Public Services self-service kiosk in the Macao SAR. At present, the Hong Kong Cross-boundary Public Services self-service kiosks and "iAM Smart" self-registration kiosks have fully covered the nine Mainland cities of the Greater Bay Area and Macao.

The legal departments of Guangdong, Hong Kong and Macao promulgated the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Arbitrator Panel and the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Mediator Panel 2025, which will enhance the interface of dispute resolution talents from Hong Kong, Guangdong and Macao. The establishment of these panels seeks to effectively promote the complementary advantages of resources and the interface of regulatory frameworks for arbitration and mediation in the three places, and promote the establishment of Greater Bay Area standards, thereby further enhancing the multifaceted dispute resolution mechanism in the Greater Bay Area.

27 January 2026

The Social Welfare Department announced that starting from 1 February, two additional residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs) located in Guangzhou and Dongguan will join the Residential Care Services Scheme in Guangdong as Recognised Service Providers. Together with the existing 24 RCHEs, the total number of RCHEs under the Scheme is increased to 26, with full coverage of the nine Mainland cities in the Greater Bay Area, offering more choices to Hong Kong elderly people who wish to retire in the Greater Bay Area.

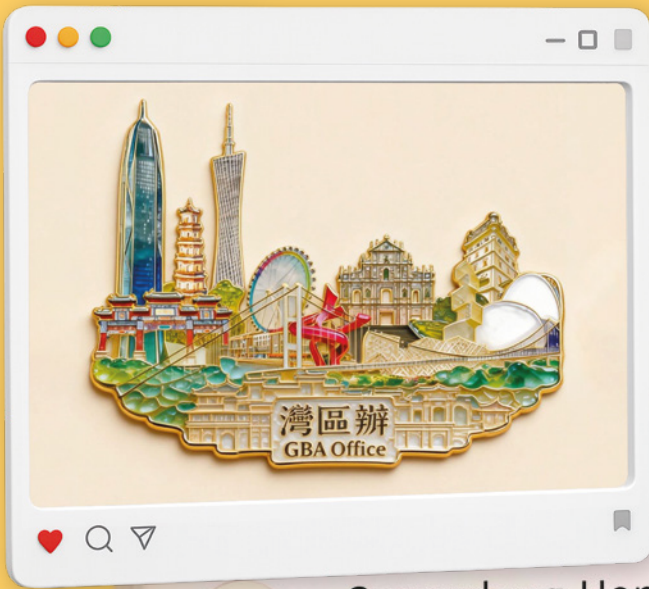

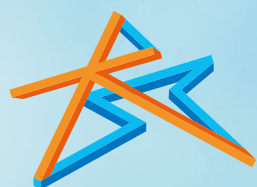

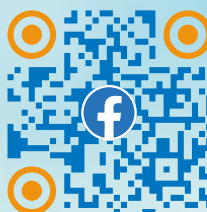
